Note: Through rule (34 CFR 200.6(a)) the US DOE has specified that a state's assessment system must provide for alternate assessments for students with disabilities whom the IEP team determines cannot participate in the state assessments even with accommodations.

- Except for students with significant cognitive disabilities, any alternate assessments must "yield results for the grade in which the student is enrolled" (in other words, the assessments must be at grade level).
- States can develop a separate alternate assessment for students with significant disabilities based on a different set of standards. States can also develop an assessment based on modified standards, but these must be aligned with grade-level content.
- For purposes of calculating AYP, results from an alternative assessment based on a different set of standards are limited to 1% of the student population (e.g., students with significant cognitive disabilities). Results from an alternative assessment based on modified standards are limited to 2% of the student population. 34 CFR 200.13

The State Board of Education, for purposes of statewide accountability, shall adopt and revise **performance improvement goals in reading, writing, science, and mathematics, by subject and grade level;** academic and technical skills in secondary CTE programs; and student attendance, as deemed appropriate to improve student learning.

- Goals may be established for all students, economically disadvantaged students, limited English proficient students, students with disabilities, and students from disproportionately academically underachieving racial and ethnic backgrounds.
- School and districts goals may be established addressing high school graduation rates and dropout reduction for secondary students.
- Goals must be presented to the Education Committees for review before adoption.
 RCW 28A.305.130(4)

Each state plan shall demonstrate, based on the academic assessments, **Adequate Yearly Progress of all public schools and school districts**. AYP must be defined so that:

- applies the same standards of achievement to all students
- is statistically valid and reliable
- results in continuous and substantial academic improvement for all students
- includes separate measurable annual objectives for all students as well as economically disadvantaged students, students from major racial and ethnic groups, students with disabilities, and students with limited English proficiency
- includes graduation rates for public secondary students
- includes at least one other academic indicator for elementary students

Each state shall establish statewide annual measurable objectives:

- set separately for the assessments of math and reading/language arts
- the same for all schools and districts
- identifying a single minimum percentage of students required to meet or exceed the proficient level on the assessments, that applies separately to each group

The SBE shall:

- Adopt objective, systematic criteria to identify schools and school districts in **need of assistance** and those in which significant numbers of students persistently fail to meet state standards, taking into consideration all statewide mandated criterion-referenced and norm-referenced standardized tests.
- Identify schools and school districts in which state intervention measures will be needed and a range of appropriate intervention strategies after the legislature has authorized a set of intervention strategies. After the legislature has authorized a set of intervention strategies, at the request of the board, the superintendent shall intervene in the school or school district and take corrective actions. This chapter does not provide additional authority for the board or the superintendent of public instruction to intervene in a school or school district.
- Identify performance incentive systems that have improved or have the potential to improve student achievement.

RCW 28A.305.130(4)

To the extent funds are appropriated, OSPI shall allocate accountability implementation funds to school districts to:

- Develop and update student learning improvement plans
- Implement curriculum materials and instructional strategies
- Provide staff professional development to implement the curricula and instruction
- Develop and implement assessment strategies and training in assessment scoring
- Fund other activities intended to improve student learning for all students. including students with diverse needs.

Activities must be consistent with the school or district improvement plan, designed to improve the ability of teachers and other staff to assist students in meeting the EALRs, and designed to achieve state and local accountability goals. Activities shall be designed to protect teachers' instructional time with students and minimize use of substitute teachers.

Each state must establish a timeline for AYP that ensure that by 2013-14, all students in each group meet or exceed the state's proficient level of academic achievement on the state's academic assessments. Sec. 1111(b)(2)(F)

Each year, for a school to make AYP, each group of students must meet or exceed the **objectives** set by the state in terms of the percentage of students required to meet or exceed the proficient level on the state assessments, measured separately by student group and by the subject of the assessment, as well as on the other indicators (high school graduation and the elementary indicator. Sec. 1111(b)(2)(I)

A school district must identify for school improvement any school that fails to make AYP for 2 consecutive years. Sec. 1116(b)(1)A)

Note: While all schools are subject to identification for not making AYP, the additional requirements imposed at successive steps of school improvement apply only to schools that receive Title I funds. Schools that fail to make AYP for 2 years move to the next successive step; those that make AYP for 2 years exit school improvement.

Requirements for Title I schools in school improvement and their school districts:

- Step 1: Develop or revise a two-year school improvement plan with technical assistance provided by the district; Provide students the option to transfer to another school in the district that has not been identified for school improvement (unless prohibited by state law).
- Step 2: Continue the above, plus notify parents of low income children of their option to receive supplemental tutoring services from an OSPI-approved provider, paid for by the school district.
- Step 3: Continue the above, plus districts must take at least one corrective action (consistent with state law): replace school staff, institute a new curriculum and professional development, decrease management authority at the school, appoint an outside expert, extend the school year or day, or restructure the internal organization of the school.
- Step 4: Continue the above, plus the district must prepare a plan for a form of alternative governance (consistent with state law): reopen as a charter school, replace all or most of the staff; contract for the operation of the school, turn the operation of the school over to the state (if permitted under state law and agreed to by the state), any other major restructuring that makes fundamental reforms.
- Step 5: Continue the above, and implement the school restructuring plan.

Sec. 1116(b)(1) - (9)

Schools receiving funds shall develop a school student learning improvement plan to achieve the student learning goals and EALRs and to implement the assessment system and delineate how the accountability implementation funds will be used.

RCW 28A.655.130

SPI, subject to available funding, may employ **school improvement coordinators and school improvement specialists to provide assistance t**o schools and districts. The improvement specialists shall serve on a rotating basis and shall not be permanent employees. Types of assistance include:

- Assistance to schools to use student performance data and develop improvement plans based on those data
- Consultation with schools and districts concerning their WASL performance
- Consultation concerning curricula that aligns with the EALRs and WASL and that meets the needs of diverse learners
- Assistance in identification and implementation of research-based instructional practices
- Staff training that emphasizes effective instructional strategies and classroombased assessment
- Assistance in developing and implementing family and community involvement program
- Other assistance intended to improve student learning

RCW 28A.655.140

Note: Budget proviso since 2001 has provided state funding for focused assistance: "The OSPI shall conduct educational audits of low-performing schools and enter into performance agreements between school districts and the office to implement the recommendations of the audit and the community. Each educational audit shall include recommendations for best practices to address identified needs and shall be presented to the community in a public meeting to seek input on ways to implement the audit and its recommendations." There is also a budget proviso for a high school and school district improvement program modeled after the focused assistance program.

What happens if the target is exceeded

The SBE shall adopt **objective**, **systematic criteria to identify successful schools and school districts** and recommend to SPI schools and districts to be recognized for two types of accomplishments: student achievement and improvements in student achievement.

Recognition for improvements in student achievement shall include consideration of one or more of the following accomplishments:

• An increase in the percent of students meeting standards.

Note: School districts must also be identified as needing improvement for failure to make the district version of AYP. Step 1 requires development/revision and implementation of an improvement plan; Step 2 requires implementation of the plan and at least 1 corrective action taken by the state as consistent with state law: deferral of program funds or a new curriculum. States must provide technical assistance.

Note: The NCLB Blue Ribbon Schools award recognizes elementary, middle and high schools that are either academically superior or that demonstrate dramatic gains in student achievement to high levels. In 2008 there were 320 schools nationwide; 4 from Washington.

To the extent feasible, schools serving English language learner students and their parents shall translate the plan into the primary language of the family.
